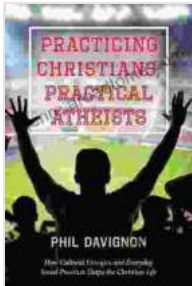

Challenge: Atheists dismiss Jesus Christ as a mythical figure or a mere human teacher, denying his divinity and resurrection.

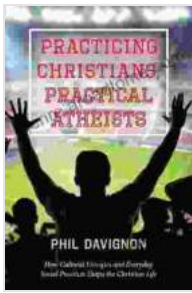

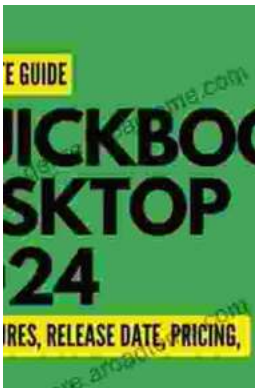
